Dr Goh and the partners from Talunga Clinic have proposed that a Community Health Hub be established at Talunga Park. This would be a great asset to our community and hopefully it would also be a vehicle for encouraging people to improve their quality of life by undertaking exercise and thinking about their general wellbeing.

The next proposal is for the re-surfacing of the Tennis / Netball Courts. Now that the Tennis season is almost upon us, and the MP Netball has had a resurgence, it would be timely to have this community asset refurbished. The third project is one Paula and I cooked up. After listening to people complain for years about the state of the CWA garden, and discussing at length some ideas on what sort of improvements could be made that would make the space more usable for everyday, and also for our big events like the Anzac Dawn Service, The Australia Day Breakfast and our fabulous Street Party, we came up with some ideas and submitted them. As the FMN site only enabled us to add 100 words, and another 300 to describe it further – not to mention only giving us a few weeks to come up with some ideas - we were really happy when it made it through to the voting round. Here's where you come in. Voting is now open and you can vote for up to 5 projects. When you register on the website, you will be asked to supply a valid email and a mobile phone number - this can be a little awkward for those of you who have only one of those - and more so for those who don't have any! Paula and I will be having a sausage sizzle in front of the Post Office on Friday and we would be happy to explain our ideas, as well as the others mentioned earlier, and show you how you can work through this process. It is important for our town that as many people as possible vote for their preferred projects.

As usual there are quite a few things on this month – including a great show from the Top of the Torrens mob – "Phantom of the Talent Factor", the Friends of the Hospital's Fete out at Glen Devon, Remembrance Day, Elysium Winery have an event on $25^{\rm th}$, Pink FootGolf on $26^{\rm th}$ and there's Country Music on the 4th at Tungkillo.


Fund My Neighbourhood community voting has opened and some great projects have been proposed by Barossa Council residents.

"Had" being the operative word, because Mum had good cause not to trust him. Dad was lovely, but work often took over and he was easily distracted.

My earliest memory of Dad being in charge was when he took me to 'the Mount' (Mount Gambier). As well as being a general carrier, his sideline was as a builders' supplier, and many houses in the South East during the fifties were built of Mt Gambier stone.

I was so excited to be allowed to go and did as I was told and stayed in the cab of the truck while Dad dealt with the loading. While I was waiting, one of the workers decided it would be a good idea to make me a gift of a baby rabbit they had just found. Sadly, the rabbit didn't seem to like me, and it wasn't long before it had abandoned my lap and crawled under the seat, but not before leaving me covered in rabbit poo and piddling on me. It took me a while to tell him, by then we were a long way down the track, but Mum figured it out pretty quickly when we got home – I still remember the smell. It took a long time and a lot of cursing for Dad to find the rabbit, and I never did find out what became of it.



The next time, he took my brother Paul and I to a local sand quarry. A recipe for disaster. All I remember was us playing about a bit at the bottom, then Paul decided to climb and the whole wall seemed to be coming down at once Paul burying completely, and Dad and the quarry man to their knees. It seemed to take ages but they eventually pulled Paul out and I vividly recall that his eyes, ears and mouth were full of

sand, and Dad was wondering if he could get it all off before Mum found out.

A few years later (yep, it took that long before she trusted him again), there was a display at the local aerodrome. And Dad piled us all in the car to take us out for the day – I think Mum was home with a very young baby and she wouldn't have protested too much at the prospect of some peace and quiet. A few hours later he was back home, telling Mum he'd had a great time. Mum said that "was lovely dear, but where are the kids?" Still sitting, waiting on the bench outside the airport building where he'd told us to wait... all four of us.

Mum didn't let him babysit us again, that usually fell to me – after all I was a mature 12 year old, and back in those days it wasn't unusual, although my Grandmother told Mum she was soft for ringing and checking on us during the

night, and making sure we'd had the door locked.

When he became a Grandfather, and we came down from the bush and had to do three months' shopping in two days, Dad was wonderful at looking after the boys – of course, supervised by Mum.

Nowadays – we call it what it really is – looking after the kids. Not babysitting, like they belong to someone else. If you're a part of the equation – you do your bit. Just like the housework – you live in the house – you help make the mess – you clean up. You eat – you cook. It's simple really. Although there are still a few diehards who think those rules don't apply to them, and we let them get away with it. In my house we go with the 'we don't want to be hungry so Sue cooks' motif. The MOTH did try cooking after he semi-retired – I suspect he didn't try all that hard (although he does cook a good steak), and in the end we compromised (?) and I do the shopping, cook the food, and he eats. Occasionally, he washes up.


And they were not disappointed. To background music, including John Williamson's "All Australian Boys Need a Shed" and Joe Cocker's "You Can Leave Your Hat On," relating to the custom of MPMS members to turn up at functions wearing a variety of headgear, visitors were kept entertained and amused while they discussed the workings of Men's Sheds and how all Sheds can benefit from working with head office.



However, the reality was ... it was the health professionals that the visitors came to see. The Mount Pleasant Hospital and the Talunga Clinic provided nurses and a doctor to give a free health check to those men who wished to take advantage of the offer. The results could then be taken to their local GP for follow up. Local MP, Stephan Knoll, had his third check-up at a Mount Pleasant "Spanner in the Works?" and we are keeping an eye on his health as he tackles his duties in the electorate of Schubert in preparation for March 2018.

The main hall was set up in Expo style with men's health ambassadors representing Alzheimer's, Arthritis, Cancer Council, CoTA, Diabetes, Hearing, Justices, Mobility Aids, Optician, Palliative Care, Podiatry, Prostate, Sleep Apnoea and Vet Affairs. The presenters were kept busy responding to a variety of questions throughout the day and they

Local Councils will receive reports from representatives Jo Thomas, Barossa Council and Steve Wilkinson, Mid Murray Council. Jo and Steve attended "Spanner in the Works? #3" and commented on the presentation. Both councils have been leading supporters of the MPMS with regard to both fundraising and support in building our Shed.

Following the clean-up, debrief and co-ordinator Murray Henderson's recovery from the marathon event, the question was asked as to whether the Mount Pleasant Men's Shed would do it all again in 2019 - "Spanner in the Works? #4". The men's health day itself was successful, however taking into account the work leading up to the event, the time and money spent on advertising, reaching out to those men in close proximity to Mount Pleasant, the regrettably, did not meet expectations. dav. Timor-Leste Coffee Project

Do you want to partner with Roasted On in supporting East Timorese coffee

farmers? There is a meaningful direct trade opportunity that can help our closest neighbor and the poorest nation outside of sub-Saharan Africa.

We are talking to a coffee importer who has been working with East Timorese coffee farmers and co-operatives for more than ten years. Their Timor-Leste coffee project has supported passionate and dedicated Timorese people in improving the lives of poor farmers.

They provide training to co-op members including pruning and weeding to improve yields, optimal harvest time and sorting the coffee cherry. They make pre-payments to member households before harvest season, based on an estimate of their yield for that season. They are the only company in Timor doing this. They buy the highest quality coffee from the farmers (paying amongst the highest prices in Timor) and assist them to sell lower quality cherry to other buyers.

Coffee traders, importers and roasters can create these opportunities but ultimately the power lies with coffee drinkers to make them happen. If Roasted On can find 10 Mount Pleasant customers to commit to buying 500 grams of East Timor coffee once a month for three months, then we will commit to an initial order with Tradewinds. The cost will be \$25 per 500 grams. This is a higher price than normal to better support the farmers.

Coffee ethics is a murky world and we avoid using certifications to "greenwash" consumers. There are currently no plans to spend money on getting FairTrade certification but instead work on finding more meaningful direct trade opportunities like this one.

At the same time visitors can chat with staff and access a host of information and support on things such as career planning, health and wellbeing.


