Pitch not Perfect



For a few years it has been recognised that the cricket pitch area on the oval was in a dreadful state of repair and dangerous to all users. The original pitch had another layer added some time ago, and the top layer was cracked. Previously soil had been added to cover it, but this made the mound quite large, so the MP Progress Association (MP Inc.) submitted a new initiative to The Barossa Council (TBC) and it was recently removed. If cricket returns to the oval, a replacement pitch may be added in the future.

Thank you to all who contributed to the feedback to TBC's proposed Talunga Park Masterplan, and we await the next round with interest.

MP Inc. has asked that some money also be spent on the local playgrounds, and an order for new fencing along the Torrens behind the hall has been put into TBC, but has yet to be commenced.

Mind nbn-ingly hard to take

If you read the newsletter after the last kerfuffle, you might have noticed that Telstra were offering a few 'you beaut' modems for people to trial the same as which has been advertised on the telly lately. I have to say that as I was typing this, Facebook was full of reports of



people without internet again – but mine was fine, as I have a trial one. Sadly the post Office was out again as some people found when they went in to pay bills on Monday.

I still have no idea what is going on with the outages, and I think it would be helpful if we could receive a definitive answer. Those who rung early to report an outage this time had to go through the same lengthy process as anyone who



has lost their internet – that is - "have you tried turning it off and then on again?", etc. Those who rung later received an automated message after reporting the outage which directed them to use their mobiles to access the Telstra

website, which would then let them know when the repairs would be complete, and according to Facebook again, there are varying dates and times as to when that is likely to happen. Let's hope it isn't fifteen days for some like last

In the meantime, according to the people who dropped in to the library to tell us about the availability of the NBN on 6th April, you have around eighteen months to connect and if you haven't by then - you're out of luck. So read up on it and find out what will work for you. Good Luck!

As an aside, while I was there the couple before me were trying to find out what to do, and when the female partner was told that her husband needed to give his permission to access the account, she was not happy. Yes, I know it's a privacy issue, but it may pay to check with Telstra exactly who has access. I went through this a few years ago and it felt like the dark ages.

UPDATE

As I was ready to print, there were more annoyed responses posted on Facebook, and I got in touch with MP Stephan Knoll's office to see if he could shed any light on the matter.

Stephan's office was then notified – like other consumers - that the outage would be fixed by the end of the day on the 1st May. Obviously that hasn't happened, so the Telecommunications Ombudsman has also been contacted, and I hope that will speed things up.

This is getting to be such a farce. Why is this happening NOW? I cannot recall ANY outages on such a scale since we've been here - over 22 years. Is Telstra trying to force the issue with the take-up of the NBN - after telling us we have 18 months to comply? Stay tuned.

This ageing game

A collaborative regional event with the aim of delivering improved access to up-to-date information relevant to the ageing community, has being awarded the 2018 Minister for Health and Wellbeing - Excellence in Public Health Award, in the Regional category.

The Ageing in Style Expo was recognised as an innovative project delivering positive health, social and wellbeing outcomes to an ageing community.

The Barossa Council, Light Regional Council, Town of Gawler and Adelaide Plains Council's Ageing in Style Expo held its first regional roadshow in 2014, as a way to provide increased access to information, especially in relation to changes to aged care funding, for a generation of older people who value face-to-face contact in preference to engaging online.

The next Expo will be held in Gawler on 11 May followed by one on 30 August in Kapunda and 26 October in Nuriootpa.

An ambitious \$64million project to develop transformational infrastructure including sporting, cultural and commercial use tourism accommodation and culinary training facilities across the Barossa region, is at the heart of The Barossa Council's Regional Growth Fund Expression of Interest submission.

Council, in partnership with Château Tanunda, has submitted an Expression of Interest (EOI) for the Regional Growth Fund for its Barossa Global Food and Wine Project, which is a component of The Big Project.

The joint proposal for the "Barossa Global Wine & Food Project" has two elements, both identified as essential transformational infrastructure that will grow industry, jobs and region.

This will be achieved through public use infrastructure development of sporting and cultural facilities and events; the second through commercial use infrastructure of global standard wine and tourism accommodation, training and job readiness facilities.

The total cost of the Barossa Global Wine and Food Project stands at \$64million, with Council's project costs estimated at \$34.7million supported by \$17.35 million from Council and partnership contributions.

Mayor Bob Sloane acknowledges the many projects that form part of The Big Project and can deliver high benefits to the community, but not all of these meet the requirements of the grant program.

Mayor Bob Sloane said, "Our goal is to deliver premium facilities that will help drive growth, Australian GDP and jobs as well as increasing our regional community capacity and further taking the Barossa brand to the world stage.

"This project has the potential to unlock numerous economic opportunities for the region, as well as contributing to creating a more resilient and engaged community.

"It's about creating an even greater place to live, work and invest."

Apparently there is to be some monies spent on Arts projects (as yet unnamed) in Mt Pleasant and Williamstown in the not too distant future. This is inline with the 'Culture Hub' proposed for the Barossa. 





Celebrating the 150th birthday of our State Heritage listed Police Station in style!

Continuing on with the 175 theme this year – commemorating 175 years of settlement – Chris and Steve Birrell threw open the doors of their house – literally – enabling out community and interested people to visit and share this great occasion with them.

When the old Police Station closed down a few years ago and our policing presence was reduced to a shop front, many of us within the community were concerned about the fate of this beautiful old State Heritage listed building. It seemed that the Police department wasn't in a hurry to resolve it's fate, and we all know what happens to old buildings that aren't lived in and cared for. Meetings were held, the council was contacted and politicians were canvassed. But to no avail, and we learned that the old building would be put on the market. When Chris and Steve bought it we were ecstatic - especially when their first port of call was the History Room. They must have thought we were mad because we all converged on them and basically demanded to know what their intentions were. Thankfully they were not put off by this excessive enthusiasm, and Chris - who has mad skills in curating and preserving paper items is still coming every week to help us conserve our collection.

When Chris first put forward the idea of inviting the Police Historical Society members and past Officers on Charge, we were quite excited to be involved – but the

Paula and I had visited the Police Museum at Thebarton (near the old Adelaide Gaol), and were impressed by what we saw, and gathered a small amount of information and some digital photos to add to Chris' collection. We then sent them a formal letter asking them if they'd like to attend – and

maybe bring some police memorabilia with them. (For those who are interested, the SA Police Historical Society's Open Day will be held on Sunday $6^{\rm th}$ May – checkout the information on the Bits and Bobs page.)

Then we thought we might contact the Band of the SA Police, and they very kindly offered us the Clarinet Quartet

to play a couple of sets.

Williams brought along her beautiful Clydesdale Jodie to give people





an idea of the type of horses most likely used by Mounted Constables. They would have been closer to a Clydesdale appearance, as they had to be more than just a horse to be ridden. There is one story from the archives that tells of a mounted constable who had stopped a dangerous situation in Springton, and had brought back the offender. Unfortunately his horse

had thrown a shoe whilst in Springton and he'd had to have it shod in order to return to Mt Pleasant. In true

Government style, he'd filled out request after request to be recompensed for his two and sixpence, but to no avail.

Then we thought it might be good to produce a fortified wine to be sold as a fundraiser – especially nice as the nights are starting to draw in – and as we had a master winemaker literally on our doorstep in Colin Forbes, this seemed like an excellent idea. So

after much research by Colin – and some very informed tasting on our parts – Colin blended a smooth Muscat, which we offered for sale on the day.

Now everybody knows you can't drink a good drop like that by itself, so that's where






