# CWA's special guest - Ruth Shanks

#### President of the Associated Country Women of the World

On another wintry, blustery day we welcomed Ruth Shanks to our town. It was an official 'Table Day' for the group, and having Ruth along, as well as the President of the S.A. C.W.A. was a bonus.

Ruth spoke briefly about her path to this position, which she has held for 12 years, and then proceeded to tell us about how the ACWW changes women's lives throughout the world. A multicultural board runs the organization, with 9 of the 16 members not having English as their first language, which often makes for an extended meeting as everyone has their say. Often meetings are conducted via Skype, as not many can make the journey to head office twice a year. Ruth says she is particularly proud that there are so many members from developing countries whose voices are getting louder on the world stage. The group was formed in 1929, and went truly international in 1932, giving rural women a much bigger voice than previously. Madge Watt from Canada was the driving force, and the Women's Institute of England has it's roots in the Canadian group. Madge was so influential that the Canadian government has declared her a 'Woman of Importance'. The ACWW is called 'Madge Watt House' wherever it is located, in her honour. Currently it is located in London. There are 350 to 400 member societies in the ACWW, located in 40 countries. It is particularly important for developing countries that they receive funding and the group has been advocating with the UN for rural women since 1947, although this work is not as prominent nowadays, Ruth is determined to change this. The group has been invited to present at the FAO (Food & Agriculture Organisation) of the UN in Rome and Russia, speaking about how climate change impacts on rural women.

The group is keen to collect information on things that concern rural women – the last major survey being undertaken in the 1930's, it's probably time for an update! A global online survey of the living conditions of rural

women has been launched, and you can find it on www.ifrw.org.uk - please take the time to take part in this crucial survey. It is hoped that this will be done every 3 to 4 years. The information will include no personal data except your postcode, and the Red Cross and World Vision will use the results.

It is hoped that in the near future the ACWW will be consulted by the UN as a matter of course on rural women's issues.

Ruth spoke on many more issues, far more than can be mentioned here – she was

hugely interesting and a great ambassador for Australia and rural women worldwide, and we thank her very much for her time.

Enrol to Vote to have your say!



Councils are part of the democratic framework of Australia.

The community elects their Council Members every four years and the next general election happens in 2018. With nearly 360,000 people voting in 2014 state wide, Council elections are the biggest single voluntary civic participation activity in the State. Voting in council elections is open to broader range of people than State and Federal elections, including non-Australian citizens, non-resident landlords and businesses. Enrol now to have your say.

# **Enrolling to vote**

The voters' roll for council elections consists of two components – the House of Assembly (State) roll, and the council supplementary roll.

If you are on the House of Assembly roll you will automatically receive a voting pack mailed to your registered address.

If you have moved house or changed your name, you need to complete a new enrolment form, available at your local Post Office or at the Electoral Commission SA office located at Level 6/60 Light Square, Adelaide or by calling them on 1300 655 232 to request a form be sent to you. To check and update your enrolment got to: https://www.ecsa.sa.gov.au/enrolment/check-and-update-your-enrolment

If you are not enrolled on the House of Assembly roll you may be eligible to register on the council supplementary roll if:

- You have been resident at your current address for one month and are not on the State Electoral Roll
- You are a sole owner/occupier of rateable property
- You are NOT an Australian Citizen but you have been a resident at your current address for one month
- You are a landlord for rateable property
- You are an organisation/business owner or occupier of rateable property
- You are a group of owners or occupiers of rateable property.
- \* Enrolment for the 2018 council elections closes at 5pm on Friday 10 August 2018.

# A Memorial Garden?

On the 16th May a work party from The Barossa Council descended upon the CWA Garden and took out the couple of pieces of play equipment. I spoke to the man who was in charge and asked what was happening and he told me that it was a replacement issue, that all playground equipment had a 'use by' date and this was scheduled. He showed me the board located by the bridge, which had photos of the work that was to be carried out, and told me the CWA garden would have the equipment replaced within 3 days. I was pretty alarmed by this, as the Community Association has asked TBC to consider a proposal for returning the garden to what was originally intended - before the last 'overhaul' was undertaken a handful of years ago. Many people have been concerned about the state of the garden and the difficulty in maintaining it, as well as the fact that the plantings have rendered the area too small for large community events such as Anzac Day and Australia Day. I rang the Secretary of the MP Progress Association and asked for her help in contacting TBC and requesting that they NOT replace the couple of pieces of play equipment, as there is another playground adjacent to the hall, and play equipment may not fit in with the revised plan for the garden. A few days later, they replaced them. Then to compound matters, the day after

an extremely heavy downpour, they drove a truck through the only patch of nice lawn (to attend to the sump) and left huge gouges. It is a pity that TBC seems so inflexible and willing waste money replacing something, only for it to be taken out in the near future. thev were so worried about litigation. it might behoove them to the speed up replacement of the collapsing fence along the Torrens, adjacent to the play areas.

Due to its broad-crown, this tree makes an excellent street or park tree, where there is adequate space for it to show-off all its autumn charm.

The red oak is a fast growing, long lived deciduous tree. Well structured, this tree grows straight and tall, developing a solid trunk and rounded top with age. Bark is grey-brown in colour and foli age is broad and glossy. In its native area, where winter temperatures are quite low, the dark green foliage turns quite a vibrant red colour, however in Australia cities, leaves will be more likely to turn a maroon-red colour before falling. (Mount Pleasants' cold frosts should provide great colour into the future)

It grows well in most soils. With a little regular irrigation, it will grow relatively quickly.

#### Avenue Quality

These trees are large, magestic looking and ideal for grand entrances where there is sufficient space to plant.

#### Deciduous

These trees have leaves that fall off or are shed seasonally to avoid adverse weather conditions such as cold over winter.

This type of tree provides commanding shade when fully mature. A great option for summer

Red Oaks are true feature trees, they are a noteworthy selection due to their size, shape, foliage cover, seasonal colour or general knock-out attractiveness. They can stand-alone in any garden or park.





Last year the MP Progress Association Inc gave a short presentation about this at one of the Community Dinners, and we were given this information at the last dinner. A lot of forethought and planning has gone into the design, and it is hoped that the community will be able to see the benefits of some long term planning to beautify and unite an area that needs it. We started with the two Mount Pleasant Cemeteries, taking note of the oldest graves, with Paula making sure to commemorate fallen soldiers and Kath ensuring she took out as many weeds as possible!

Then on to Tungkillo, where although the sun shone brightly for about ten minutes, we made sure to clamber back into the bus quick smart when the misty rain started. From there we went to Milendella, where the rain decided to set in a bit more. As we left we drove past the beautiful little church, telling ourselves to go back on a sunny day for a better look.

We arrived at the Pretoria Hotel, Mannum half an hour earlier than planned, but they were ready for us and we didn't have to wait long before we were served. Members of the Mannum Historical Society joined us, and Paula took the time for some catching up, before we all boarded the bus again for the trip to their large cemetery. It was an interesting tour, with the cemetery divided into three distinct parts – the old, the new, and the RSL section.

We then drove past Summerfield Church, which had a small school next to it until the early sixties. A beautiful church and we hope that next time we'll be able to arrange a tour.

Then on to Palmer Cemetery, which was another containing graves of predominantly German settlers and those of German descent.

Last, but not least a stop at the pretty Palmer Lutheran Church, with it's amazing carved font and altar (below), and beautiful stained glass windows.

A fantastic day, despite the inclement weather, and we promise to do it again!

"Paula Bartsch is founding curator of the Mount Pleasant District History Room and has volunteered countless hours in researching the Mt Pleasant area, collecting newspaper clippings, sorting through photographs and compiling a whole range of historical information into archive style. In July 2014, Paula was awarded the inaugural South Australian Regional History Award in recognition of her efforts and the role she plays in examining, writing, teaching and raising community awareness of history and heritage in the Mount Pleasant district. Paula Bartsch has spent more than a decade researching the Mount Pleasant, Eden Valley, Springton, Tungkillo and Palmer areas, and in 2006 was selected to open the Mount Pleasant District History Room to share her extensive findings and knowledge with the public. From 2013 to 2014, she dedicated a majority of her time to investigating and compiling a 300-page book showcasing the past 150 years of the Mount Pleasant Agricultural, Horticultural and Floriculture Society."

Paula and I attended a two day GLAM Peak (Galleries, Libraries, Archives & Museums – and Historical Societies) workshop on Digital Access to Collections - adding to the one we did in April. This one covered many topics including what formats to save digital copies of photos and documents, and just what TIFF means, how to set up items to be photographed, scanning equipment, copyright laws and regulations, as well as showcasing different databases on which to organise the collections. There were a diverse range of other groups represented, and we caught up with a few people who'd been to the last one. Collections ranges from preserving information on the MATS Plan and it's impact from the 70's, to an Aviation museum, Genealogists, Costumiers, the Freemason's collection and a group from Port Adelaide. Some groups had heaps of volunteers - but no money, or a venue and a few volunteers, or very few volunteers and very little money and a small venue (us!), but all of us came away with renewed vigour, and the knowledge that we were not alone. We have formed some great links and hopefully there will be a network of groups like ours with which we can swap ideas and information.
