

The Mount Pleasant Men's Shed has many facets. At this time our published opening times are Monday and Wednesday mornings from 09:00am to 12:00 noon although these times vary depending on the conversations at the time.

Our project scribe and one-time snag cooker, Bill Bartsch, produces the Mount Pleasant Men's Shed Activity Calendar which is updated on a regular basis. The Activity Calendar lists the projects underway at the time of posting, the meeting place and time of the project and directions, if required. For example:

on the 'dog and bone'! George has a pile of orders on his chopping block that have to be filled and the call goes out to 'round up the usual subjects'.

This time of the year when there is frost on the ground and a chill in the air, the calls come in for wood – firewood quality firewood, and lots of it. Firewood is the Mount Pleasant Men's Shed main source of revenue to pay those persistent bills that keep arriving. George watches the weather patterns on the ABC News, picks the best day, heads over to Barr(ie)'s place to discuss the plan while playing pool and lowering the level in a bottle of red. A decision is made and the call goes out to the usual suspects, and our team of Lumberjacks meet early in the morning at the Men's Shed, stamping the frosty earth, steamy breaths cloud the air, form a convoy and head out to cut some wood.

Here I should point out that the skill of cutting and splitting large fallen red gum trees into pieces of firewood that will fit into a regular wood heater, is an art that can only be attained with practice.

Out on the job Lumberjack George rules with an iron hand, yet with the bargaining skill of a conman. Meal breaks are essential so that the Mount Pleasant Men's Shed Wood Gatherers can boil the billy, or in these more modern times bring out the thermos, sit on a stump, exchange a biscuit or a piece of cake, courtesy of Yvonne, and tell outrageous stories of how they did it 'back in the day'.

This is the time when we hear the mischief John Bowd got up to when he moved to South Australia, Don Barrett tell yarns of his time as a copper chasing bushrangers across outback SA and George recalls some of those weekend coach runs to the snow, 'back in the day'. Some of the

that stories Les Fisher tells of his younger days when attending a PMG linesman training down at Rostrever and would bring a young nurse, Kath, to Mount up Pleasant for а



woolshed dance then out to Rum Jungle for a couple of beers, bring back our own memories.

Skilled wood gathers are scarce however the Mount Pleasant Men's Shed is overwhelmed with certified Lumberjacks. Our chainsaw team of George (OBE), treasurer, builder and architect John, intrepid 4WD enthusiast Roger, Men's Health devotee Bob and all-

rounder Les (trades in his metal detector for a chainsaw), get down and carve up the fallen timber into manageable lengths where it is carried to the splitting team. The wood splitting



team are pros at their trade. Wearer of the tartan Murray, secretary and coach driver Don, another of our skilled carpenters Barry, President and vigneron Colin, all-rounder Les, (minus metal detector and chainsaw), all working in

unison they turn the sawn logs in firewood ready for The wood sale. splitter is positioned not too far from the chainsaws. far enough to miss the clouds of sawdust and cacophony of noise and still close



enough to a trailer for easy loading - a task in itself.

The splitting team load the sawn wood onto the splitter, set the hydraulic ram in motion and the timber is split, repositioned, split to a manageable size for the loaders to pack into the trailers. Then again, and again, and again until at last senior Lumberjack George calls for smoko or the trailer is full – whatever comes first. Property owner and

supplier of the wood Rod, ambles over with his arm in a sling to assist with smoko.

I have been out with the wood-gatherers a number of times mostly on the loading team. Our draftsman Brian sets

and we drove back to Mount Pleasant. Lumberjack George did wake me when we arrived back in Hocknull Place and helped me into my car for the drive home.

However, for every downside there is an upside as another three hundred been bucks has secreted into the account bank to ensure that the exists MPMS for another month or two.

Writer's Workshop

At the end of July Sue and I made the trek down to Naracoorte to attend the Kanawinka Writer's Workshop. It was very intense, we learned a lot, and we met a lot of really interesting people. I came away with a number of ideas for upcoming projects and both of us were inspired by the tales of determination and doggedness these authors showed in order to tell their stories. A representative from Wakefield Press was in attendance, as well as printers who helped us understand the printing and publication process. There were many books for sale – which were extremely tempting, and if you are interested in South Australian history, you can't go past the Wakefield Press.

We heard Antony Laube from the State Library who spoke on 'The treasures of Trove' and gave great hints about searching on this wonderful resource. Trove is a 'go-to' place for anyone wanting that extra bit of information or possible photograph. Marion Hextall spoke on other valuable online sources, reminding we researchers of places to visit for that extra snippet. All in all the weekend reminded us of what we can achieve, and gave clues on how to present our research in a manner that would be appealing to all.

The writers who spoke during the workshops were Rosalie Triolo (Senior Lecturer at Monash University – History & History of Education), Lainie Anderson (Journalist – who is writing a book about the Smith Brothers and their ground breaking 1919 flight), Kristen Weidenbach (Growing up Moonta), Liz Harfull (The Australian Blue Ribbon Cookbook) and Judith Murdoch (author of 11 local history books, and who taught me Social Studies!). Judith was also presented with the South Australian Regional Historian for 2018 Award by Pauline Cockrill, Community History Officer from History Trust of SA.

What stood out to me about the weekend of Writer's Workshop was that many people self-publish, as I have, and often that is the only way to produce a product that will look just as you want!




