The least we deserve is that they do their jobs to the best of their abilities, and if they can't - get out.

Association, opened the event by acknowledging the Peramangk People, then congratulated and thanked the artists, the sponsors and, in particular, the volunteers for collaborating to ensure a successful and enjoyable social event.

As with many events in Mount Pleasant, volunteers play a key role. The SALA opening was anchored by the ladies in the kitchen who prepared cheese platters, exotic Asian dips, fresh and dried fruit, biscuits and bread plus mugs of hot and spicy soup, a comfort food for a cold, wintry night. There was tea and coffee available plus an array of donated wines from local producers. The relaxing background music of folk band Tamarisque set the scene for a very convivial market atmosphere.

The team leader for SALA in Mount Pleasant, Terese Stephens, who has been in and around the floral industry for over 35 years, created a rural centrepiece, an early settler's jinker laden with farming paraphernalia and bedecked with flowers, fruit and vegetables which subscribed to the theme of *Farm to Market Town*. Terese, Joe Dennis and Barrie Spencer, artists and important cogs in the Mount Pleasant SALA wheel, worked with Men's Shed volunteers to prepare the Atrium for opening night.





History Notes





History at the Show

This year at the Poultry, Pigeons and Eggs pavilion, not only will you see - and hear - and amazing number of poultry and breeds, but you will also see a fantastic historical display on the roles animals played in World War 2 – including a large number of Pigeons. During the war, animals that performed outstanding feats of valour received the Dickin Medal. Which in animal terms, is akin to the Victoria Cross.

To quote Wiki:

The PDSA (People's Dispensary for Sick Animals) Dickin Medal was instituted in 1943 in the United Kingdom by Maria Dickin to honour the work of animals in World War II. It is a bronze medallion, bearing the words "For Gallantry" and "We Also Serve" within a laurel wreath, carried on a ribbon of striped green, dark brown, and pale blue. It is awarded to animals that have displayed "conspicuous gallantry or



devotion to duty while serving or associated with any branch of the Armed Forces or Civil Defence Units". The award is commonly referred to as "the animals' Victoria Cross" (although the Victoria Cross Trust has opposed this association).

The two Australian

connections:

DD.43.T.13, a pigeon in February 1947: Brought message of foundered ship in the "Huon Gulf" in time to salvage it and its cargo; served with the Royal Australian Corps of Signals. DD.43.Q.87, a pigeon in February

1947: Only survivor of three pigeons released to warn of an impending counter-attack at Manus island. Reached headquarters in time to extract a US Marine Corps patrol; served with the Royal Australian Corps of Signals.

Shame they didn't have any exotic names! For the full list, check out the Wikipedia entry.






