Drive my Future

youthbarossa

The launch of Drive My Future is set to give learner drivers increased confidence and time behind the wheel.

The Youth Barossa project in collaboration with The Barossa Council and sponsors supports young Barossa people aged 16 to 25 facing disadvantage.

The in-car support program matches experienced volunteer drivers with learner drivers to boost their driving hours and experience.

Drive My Future Coordinator Kathy Schilling said independent surveys show many young people are struggling to achieve the hours needed for their P plate licence.

"Barriers include single parent working families, availability of a suitable car, young people who are primary or secondary carers or have a sibling with a disability, or who may be living independently," said Kathy.

She said the program gives them access to a volunteer and a vehicle.

"It's not a replacement of a Learner Driver system; the volunteers act as a parent or care giver who would assist the learner driver gain the hours needed for their P plate licence," Kathy said.

"The program is based on a simple idea, yet it can make a world of difference in someone's life."

Mayor Bob Sloane commended the program, saying it will have many positive flow-on effects.

"In many cases it will assist young people to gain independence or employment, participate in sport and access training opportunities," he said.

"The role of the volunteer driving supervisor is equally important and an opportunity to play a positive, caring role in the life of a disadvantaged young person."

Kathy said the program was only possible because of the collaborative effort of sponsors.

"We acknowledge the generosity of many organisations, businesses and community who have laid the foundation for a sustainable, long-term program that will put young people on the road to independence," she said.

Bookings will open in October at a cost of \$16.50 per hourly session. Eligible participants are required to participate in a road safety forum and interview, and are also offered a free car maintenance session.

Cocktails & Carriages

Those magnificent men of the MPMS have succeeded once again with the rebirth of a train arriving at the Wisteria Atrium at Talunga Park on 16th September, the centenary of the first revenue train to Mount Pleasant. The train arrived complete with smoking stack and bellowing whistle. Once again John Bowd instigated the construction but many other members chipped into the project providing authenticity to the final engine, with George Harrison OBE adding Mechanical Officionado to his list of many accomplishments. Many of the community helped celebrate this milestone with an enjoyable cocktail party with the MPDHRG members providing eats and drinks aplenty. Ross Hurley, expert on the history of the Mount Pleasant-Balhannah branchline, spoke of the history and presented a photographic record together with footage of the last historical train journey in March 1963. Paul Johnson, model maker extraordinaire together with John Bowd who assisted in the construction, unveiled the scaled model of the Mount Pleasant railway yards, which now has its home within the Atrium on a permanent basis. This MPMS project was supported by the community with donations towards the cost of materials and Paul's expertise as a model maker has created a professional record of what Talunga Park Recreation Park once was in 1963, together with the houses and buildings of the time.

Railway Centenary

Balhannah to Mt.

Discussions began during the 1850s regarding a railway route to the River Murray from Adelaide, with a meeting held at Mount Pleasant at the McBeath Inn (which was also known as the Mount Pleasant Inn, the fore-runner of the current Mount Pleasant Hotel, although placed across the river from its position today) in 1858. Over the years there were various meetings held in the regions to discuss just which route the railway should take, with consideration for a rail through Gawler, Mount Crawford and even Gumeracha, Birdwood. At the History Room I have compiled a brief history of the development of the discussions, which is available for anyone wanting a little more detail. A search on Trove in the newspapers also enlarges the story.

Finally an Act of Parliament in 1914 declared the construction of the Balhannah to Mount Pleasant Railway would go ahead. From newspaper articles however, one wonders about the viability of the service from the beginning, and it is no wonder that the railway service lasted only the 40 odd years that it did... a newspaper report of the opening commented...

... The service over the new railway will be limited to one train each way daily, and as the trains will be mixed the journey will occupy two hours. This means that the trip from Adelaide to Mount Pleasant, only 49 1/2 miles, will take 3 hours and 40 minutes. The iournev require will more patience, as the train which will leave Mount Pleasant at 3 o'clock in the afternoon will not reach Adelaide until 6 52. Such tedious travelling will certainly not have the effect of inducing people to make use of the train more often than is compulsory. Previously, when new railways have been formally opened, the school children of the districts interested have been given a free ride over the line, but on this occasion the Government are not going to go even to that slight expense....

Paul Kelly - maker of 'big things'

Paul Kelly is a local – and an artist – but he is best known for being the first person in Australia to make a 'big thing'. His first project was the iconic Scotsman, playing the bagpipes on the front of Scotty's Motel, on the corner of Nottage Terrace and Main North Road, Medindie. Scotty stands five metres tall and was officially unveiled in early 1963. (This was at least a year before the Big Banana in Coffs Harbour, which is often cited as the first in Australia.) "People said you couldn't do it and that's what bugged me ... I had to prove them wrong," he said. "People thought I was mad and I thought 'Oh, no, bugger it all, I'll do it. I took up the challenge and it worked".

"I was working with a bloke, so every morning I'd go in and measure his foot or his hands or his arm or something, multiply it by whatever the fraction was it had to be bigger," Mr Kelly recalled. "It was very easy." The Scotsman was made with a solid steel frame, which was covered in wire netting and clad in hessian. It was

was covered in wire netting and clad in hessian. It was then sprayed with a polyurethane foam and coated with a fibreglass mesh to prevent it from disintegrating and, finally, it was painted, and then shaped with a knife. The sculpture was built in three main pieces – legs, torso and head.

Scotty must have caught the eye of Ian Backler, who was looking to create something eye catching for a tourism centre at Kingston SE, and in 1979, Larry was created.

The project took six months "from start to finish". Mr Kelly based his designs on a lobster he had brought to him. "I measured it and we did the drawings for it – and we ate the crayfish," he said. A lot of people said that it must have been meant to be smaller, but Ian and Paul were adamant that it was the right size. Sadly, all didn't go well afterwards, as Paul and his wife Pam sued Ian for money they said was owed to them. Unfortunately, it didn't go well for them and they were bankrupted. Even though it didn't end well for him, Paul is very proud of his works as they are still standing over 50 years later.

Larry was on the market a short while ago – not for the first time – and Kingston pastoralist Tom Brinkworth recently struck a deal with the owners after his wife mentioned rumours Larry had been sold to a party intending to move it to Western Australia.

Mr Brinkworth has stated that the lobster would stay in place for future generations to enjoy.

Pam says she has offered the plans to Mr Brinkworth, but is yet to hear from him.

How do I join?

Before you are able to join, you must agree to a Confidential National Police History Check that is conducted by the South Australian Fire and Emergency Commission Services (SAFECOM). Once the Confidential National Police History Check has been undertaken you will receive a letter from the Chief Officer to tell you if you are able to apply to your local brigade or if your application has been rejected. If you are able to apply, you then need to present the letter to the Brigade Captain or Brigade Administration Coordinator. If you are accepted, you will be on probation for six (6) months. If you join as a firefighter, during this time you must successfully complete the Brigade Fire Fighter 1 training.

What can I do to help?

CFS offers many opportunities to contribute according to your skills, interests and availability. There are three (3) categories of membership that you may be able to apply for:

FIREFIGHTER

Firefighters are trained to deal with all kinds of emergencies:

- Bush and grass fires
- Structural fires
- Storm damage and floods
- Motor vehicle crashes
- Hazardous chemical spills
- industrial accidents
- Operational Support

OPERATIONAL SUPPORT

Operational Support members provide a range of valuable operations support services such as:

- Radio operations
- Logistics
- Catering
- Administration
- Cadets

CADET PROGRAM

If you are between 11 and 18 years old you can join the CFS as a cadet. As a cadet you will be trained by qualified and experienced volunteers in:

- Firefighting skills
- · Using fire hydrants and hoses
- Using ladders
- Using fire extinguishers
- Map reading
- Basic first aid

Do I have to provide my own uniform?

No, all Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and Personal Protective Clothes (PPC) such as overalls, boots, gloves and helmets are provided.

How often will I have to train?

Training is usually held once a week for most brigades. Some brigades train fortnightly or monthly, depending on local needs. Phone 1300 364 587 or visit here to find out when your closest brigade trains.

How much will it cost me?

CFS has a commitment to its volunteers that no out of pocket expenses should be incurred as a result of undertaking a volunteer role. The CFS provides for all training, Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and Personal Protective Clothing (PPC) you need to do the job.

How much time do I have to commit?

CFS recognises and values the contribution of its volunteers, including the time that is given. Apart from meeting the minimum requirements for training and skills maintenance, how much time you can offer can be negotiated with your Brigade Captain.

The exhibition is open 11am to 4pm Wednesday to Sunday, and continues through until 14th October.


