Mount Pleasant Show?

...but is it the 153rd?

The Mount Pleasant Show has become an institution for the district, and for all but two of the 153 years, it has been held within the town boundaries; initially in the vicinity of the current Soldiers Memorial Hall, and then on land adjacent the church building (now Townsend House) situated on Showground Road. All in all there was 13 acres of land acquired there over time by the Show Society, taking in the land between the current Saleyards and Showground Road, up to the School.

Whilst the 1941 Show had been quite successful, it was decided at the Annual General Meeting in December 1941, that due to petrol rationing, the likelihood of a successful Show was reduced, and so it should be postponed for the following year, although members were encouraged to maintain their membership for a minimum sum of 5/-. During 1942 the Defence Department had control of the Showgrounds for an Army Camp, with the 8th Auxiliary Horse Transport Regiment using the grounds for accommodation whilst training pack horses for shipping to New

Guinea, but the camp moved to Moculta in June 1942, as the conditions around Mount Pleasant had become extremely wet and boggy. In December 1943 it was decided to resume the Show for 1944, on March 18th, making two years when it was not held, but giving minimal time for patrons to prepare their entries for the various sections. Mr A. L. Starkey, as President, made the comment 'that outside entries were better than had been expected,' but that 'the indoor entries were weak.' The ring had been surrounded by a new pipe fence, and this was early on lined with cars.

At the December 1944 Annual General Meeting there had been an offer put forward by the Presbyterian Church, for the Show Society to purchase the church building. The Show Society asked that repairs be made to the roof of the Hall, after which consideration would be made to the offer; it was during 1945 that the Presbyterian Church sold the building for £500. This building had been used each year for the Indoor Exhibition Hall, and this continued throughout the life of the Show at this vicinity, until 1977, after which time the Show has been held at Talunga Park.

The Poultry Shed and Exhibition Hall were removed from the old Showgrounds to Talunga Park; the roof of the former being transported in one piece on Graham Elliott's low-loader. What a sight that must have been... with it moving onto Saleyard Road, Chibnall Road, McGorman Road, and across Melrose Street to Talunga Park. Both buildings are still in use today, although now somewhat extended as needs have demanded.

A history of the Show and the Society was written for the 2013 Show, and is still available for purchase from the Show Office on Show Day, which, this year, is Saturday, March 19th. It is a detailed history of the Ploughing Matches, which preceded the Show, and how the event has changed throughout the years. There are many photographs and if you regularly participate in the Mount Pleasant Show... your name may well be within its pages!

Uncovering Mount Pleasant's past: The Balhannah-Mount Pleasant branchline



Did you know that Talunga Park is situated on the old Railway Station and grounds?

The first meeting in reference to a railway was in 1858 at Macbeath's Inn Mount Pleasant, but it would take another 56 years and many discussions before the railway was agreed to.

Railway discussions

In the 1880's there were many meetings and deputations to politicians about routes and prices; the original proposal in 1858 described a line to come from Gawler through Mount Crawford and thence onto the River Murray. The Government however, wasn't interested.

Discussions were still being had in 1891, when during a meeting of over 100 gentlemen Mr H. Giles moved "That this meeting favours the construction of a branch line of the railway from Balhannah to Mount Pleasant by the most desirable route". Again this meeting was ignored.

A similar proposal was made in 1896 but a week later at a meeting organised by the Onkaparinga District Council, a Mr Charles Dunn moved against the railway and another 10 years lapsed before meetings were held again. In 1910 and 1911 more rail routes were proposed. One was through the Gorge to Gumeracha and Mount Pleasant. Another considered a railway to the Murray Flats through Angaston and another to the Murray Flats from Birdwood. A meeting held at Springton considered the railway from Mount Pleasant to Sedan, descending from Mount Pleasant to the ranges through a corridor such as Milendella Creek to Murray Flats, and then heading off to Sedan.

Finally, a railway is established

Act 1180 of 1914 finally authorized the building of the Balhannah to Mount Pleasant line. Initial work was started in 1915 by the South Australian Railways and then taken over by contractor H. Teasedale-Smith. The line was finished in September 1918. The people of Mount Pleasant were disappointed to find that there was to be no official opening because the Government didn't want any more expense. Because there was no opening the children of the schools on the line were given a free ride to Oakbank where they had a picnic before returning home.

How the railway ran

The line was 21 miles 17 chains long and 5'3" gauge. It was

originally planned for a turntable at Mount Pleasant but these were abandoned in late 1918, in favour of the two spurs of a triangle, which curved towards the river and met at an apex. A locomotive shed was built for housing overnight, and this allowed for the turning of a second locomotive if needed. Water was available for the steam engines from a dam nearby.

The train left Balhannah at 9.30am arriving at Mount Pleasant at 11.05am. The return trip from Mount Pleasant was at 3.00pm and got to Balhannah at 4.45pm. Passenger trains used 75 old railcars and came down at 5.30pm for the city and returned in the morning.

The main stations were constructed of timber at Oakbank, Woodside, Charleston, Mount Torrens, Birdwood and Mount Pleasant with a number of small sidings where the train might stop.

Mount Pleasant Railway Station

Was officially 1,410 feet altitude, had a passing siding, passenger platform and station building adjacent to the River Torrens.

Easter time

An interesting aspect of the Mount Pleasant line was the Easter Oakbank Races where up to 19 trains would take race goers into the Hills. The last Easter train ran in 1962.

Carrying our troops

Troops were carried to Woodside Army Camp on the train. Their siding was called Riverview.

Passenger travel

Only one mixed train per day which arrived in the morning and departing at 3pm led to discontent with the locals as it was felt this did not fit with business activities.

The end is nigh

During 1962 freight carried on the line (3,700 tons and 33,000 head of livestock) wasn't enough to justify a twice weekly service. Road transport had taken over. An order was made to close the line.

The South Australian Railways Historical Society ran two farewell trains on February 2nd, 1963 and one train on Sunday March 3rd. That was the end of the trains.

Currently

The rail corridor commenced redevelopment in 2010 as the 'Amy Gillet Bikeway', a multi-use recreational trail. This currently stops between Mount Torrens and Birdwood, but there is a group of people encouraging the extension of the bikeway to Mount Pleasant, in order to link with bikeways in the Barossa region.

Cheer-Up Huts

revisited

A Cheer-Up Hut – first erected in 1915 as a rest and recreation venue for soldiers – will reappear in South Australia’s regional cities and towns this year to provide a place for community storytelling as part of the Anzac Centenary.

Minister for Veterans’ Affairs the Hon Martin Hamilton-Smith said the re-creations are central to the State Government’s Anzac Centenary Regional Engagement Strategy.

“South Australian regional centres will host the roving Cheer-Up Hut, using it as a focal point for communities to directly engage with the Anzac Centenary,” Mr Hamilton-Smith said.

“This is an opportunity for families and the broader community to

research and record their Anzac stories and for these to be captured in one central repository for future generations.”

The Cheer-Up Hut will make its first appearance in March, as part the Spirit of Anzac Centenary Experience at the

Adelaide Showgrounds.

It will also travel to Mount Pleasant in May, Mount

Gambier in September and Port Augusta in November.

Veterans SA will partner with Local Government, RSL-

SA, Legacy Adelaide and other key stakeholders on the state-wide regional engagement project.

“We want to ensure there are many opportunities for South Australians to engage deeply with the Anzac Centenary over the next three years,” Mr Hamilton-Smith said.

“The Cheer-Up Huts provide a gateway to the past, placing people in an atmosphere that encourages reminiscence and reflection. Each will bring a community together visit memory and to encourage conversations around the impact of war that can be recorded for future generations.”

Mrs Lan Le is Patron of the Cheer-Up Hut Club, following in the footsteps of the Cheer-Up Society’s original patron, Lady Marie Carole Galway – wife of Sir Henry Galway, a former Governor of South Australia.

“I’m delighted to be the Patron of this initiative, which takes steps to remember the tremendous efforts made by so many South Australians on the homefront.”

92-year-old Pat Huwise, a member of the Cheer-Up Society during World War II, said she will be visiting the revived Cheer-Up Hut.

“I worked with a terrific group of women. When I heard the Cheer-Up Hut was being recreated I wanted to know what happened to all those wonderful women,” Ms Huwise said.

Ms Huwise was a volunteer during WWII at the Cheer-Up Hut that operated alongside the Torrens River, where the Festival Centre now stands. She also worked at the adjacent hostel for returned servicemen. Her husband served in the

Prior to attending a Cheer-Up Hut re-creation, South Australians are invited to join the *Cheer-Up Hut Club* – a digital storytelling program that

provides members with practical assistance to research, write and enhance their Anzac stories during this period of national

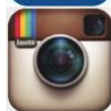
